Also gone are the days when you might expect to pay \$200 or much more for a good quality model. Penny-pinchers, listen: There are tons of MP3 players available for less than \$100, from those that just offer basic music playback to video-capable units with expandable memory. Here are five of the best models available. Best mp3 players

1. Sandisk Sansa Clip Sandisk has been an MP3 game player for quite some time, turning hit after hit in terms of good quality, multi-teammate MP3 players at a bargain price. The Sandisk Sansa clip is no exception. This little player is a great addition to the pocket of any music lover. Price: \$30 Plus: Compact design. Sandisk Sansa Clip is small but not to get lost in a small pocket, making this particular unit extremely portable and unobtrusive. The design closely mimics the one found on older iPod models, and has proven to be highly appreciated by digital music connoisseurs. Dedicated controls. Having dedicated access to the most commonly used device control feature, the volume button is great. Expandable memory. The belt clip is a good addition, and adding a memory extension of the SD card slot is a stroke of genius. Of course, 2GB of data is a lot, especially when you convert that number into something useful, like the number of songs it will keep (approximately 1300). But having the extra ability to add a removable memory card will allow you to expand the number of songs that you can store much more without having to pay the extra cost for larger units of memory. The 4GB unit costs \$50, and the 8GB unit comes in at about \$70. You can pick up an SD memory card for a few dollars apiece, depending on the storage capacity of the card. Convenient controls. I love that Sandisk has kept its custom control simple, easy to use, and even easier to remember. Support for multiple file formats. This player is compatible with just about any audio file format that you can think of. Clip supports MP3, WMA, WAV, FLAC, OGG and Audible, which means you don't need to be a computer guru to be able to download the correct files to this model - all of them will play. Good quality audio output. The clip is equipped with an exceptional sound chip that translates into some perfectly quality melodies, as long as you update the standard earpiece offering something more capable. Adding an FM tuner and a voice recorder to close is a very good selection of features. Cons: No video support. I would like Sandisk to add some functionality to view photos and videos, but for this price, I can't say I expected to see it. Short battery life. Battery life is not enough, that Currently, the average battery life is about 15 hours. Poor sound quality Ear Buds. The headphones that come with this particular model just don't make your music, or audio chip, any justice. Justice. yourself a favor and use the money you save by buying this player to buy yourself some good quality headphones. I just couldn't think of any reason you shouldn't buy Sansa Clip. This model produces music of excellent quality, has a responsive, easy-to-use control, and is priced well under some of its closest competitors. I would recommend this MP3 player to those in the audio market only portable digital music devices.
2. Sandisk Sansa Clip Tzip Sandisk Sansa clip Of Tzip is another great MP3 player from Sandisk. The main thing that sets this apart from the clip is its ability to handle audiobook files and the addition of stopwatch function for gym lovers. Price: \$40 Plus: Multiple audio support files. Like its cousin, Clip, Sansa Clip Tzip offers a quality sound that doesn't have to come out of MP3 at this price level and support a wide range of music formats, including ACC (which means you can buy from iTunes and upload your purchases to this player). You get the same easy-to-use control interface located on the front of the device, a separate volume control rocker to control the volume on the go, an expandable memory card slot, and what's really cool is the belt clip. Optimized for subscription service. Sandisk has optimized this particular model to easily accept multimedia from Rhapsody, a music subscription service. This is good news for users who like to change their music often. Included FM tuner. You will also find an FM tuner on this device, something that does not exist on many high-end MP3 players, including the Apple iPod. This means that hitting the gym early won't mean missing your favorite morning radio show. LCD display. The larger 1.1-inch color screen will display, albeit somewhat grainy, album art. Separate menus for audiobooks. There is a separate menu that deals specifically with audiobooks and podcasts which, for people like me, makes it easy to find these files without having to wade through thousands of songs in my library. Cons: Cheap Feel. The clip of The Cip feels a little cheaper than the clip in hand. No video support. You can't upload and view photos or videos, but at this price, I don't think anyone is really complaining. Short battery life. The battery is somewhat substandard, providing about 15 hours of continuous play, but there is plenty of juice to get you through the workout without leaving you high and dry. The quality of the headphones is low. You will need to throw a good set of headphones into the shopping cart to replace the ones that come with this device. Once again, Sandisk delivers a great portable audio device. If you're looking for a few updates in the clip and don't mind spending a few extra bucks, this player Great choice. Even though it is larger than its predecessor, it still fits easily in the pocket of front jeans or hooks on the belt.
3. Sandisk Sansa Fuze do you start to see the pattern here? In here? just makes good portable media playback devices, and Sandisk Sansa Fuze is no exception. What's really cool about this is that you get all the power of a high-end audio/video playback device for less than \$100. Price: \$60 Plus: Included LCD display with video support. In an attempt to keep you from suffering from deja vu, I won't flip through all the pros of other Sandisk models - but know that they all reside here. In addition to these features, however, Sansa Fuze has a shiny 2.4-inch screen. Widespread support for audio files and integrated FM tuner. Yes, this model not only handles all the usual audio formats, audiobooks, podcasts and FM radio stations, but also displays your photos and video playback functionality that far surpasses many other portable media devices out there. Not only will you get ACC audio support on this device that allows you to download iTunes purchases directly, but it's also Mac compatible, making this device the closest you get with an iPod and still keeping your out-of-pocket costs under \$100. Cons: The menu is hard to navigate. I don't like the menu structure. It's not that menus are often hard to use, but using touch-controlled navigation compared to the wheel-click control style that come standard on less expensive models requires a bit of getting used to. It took me quite a bit longer to work through the menu using this technology, which was disappointing to say the least. In fact, adding touch controls over the wheel's click control style has made doing a lot of things to feel past. Poor support for video file type. The video playback feature will only work with MP4 or WMV file formats, and while Sandisk includes video conversion software in the Fuze package, who wants to wait until other video formats are converted to an acceptable format before downloading? Lower quality audio output. I was also a little disappointed with the quality of the audio output from this device, especially in light of how good other, less expensive devices are far in this particular category. That doesn't mean it was horrible. Of course, the quality of the audio outlet competition increases in this price, but still, I expected better. Sansa Fuze is a great portable media device that will support almost anything you would like to do on a portable device, without Angry Birds and Facebook. But at this price point, it will still make a great addition to any pocket, purse, or strap.
4. Creative zen Mozaic Creative Labs is no slouch in the portable audio department, and Creative zen Mozaic is no exception. The design is a bit funky, which is just one aspect of this little device that sets it apart from the package. Price: \$60 Plus: Design. These beautiful tiles on the front of this device are more than just fast looking packaging. Nine of these tiles are actually control devices that are Integrated into the overall design of the device, which I think is a nice touch. Back to the photo display feature - you can zoom in on any aspect of your photos that you like. The transmission of media, with the exception of the video, is relatively simple. There is support for various audio file formats, including MP3, WMA, WAV and Audible. There is a lack of ACC support, which means that if you buy music through iTunes, you will have to convert it to a Mozaic friendly format before it will play. Good quality audio output. The audio output capabilities of this device are truly exceptional. The music sounds warm, rich, and inviting as long as you use some quality headphones. Long battery life. The battery lasts up to 36 hours. Microsoft's Outlook synchronization capabilities. You can sync your device with the Outlook app on your Windows PC to bring your calendar, contacts, and task lists wherever you go. Integrated Speaker and FM tuner. Integrated speaker means you can listen to your favorite tunes or watch videos without using headphones - at least as long as you don't bother your neighbors. You will also get an FM tuner as well as audiobooks and podcast support. Cons: Small internal memory capacity and no expandable memory capabilities. What you see is what you get in terms of capacity. This is due to the fact that Creative Labs has decided not to add an expandable memory slot. Limited support for the video-video format. Support for the video format is very limited, so most videos need to be converted using the included video conversion app before downloading. Limited OS compatibility. There is no Mac support for this device, and even PC users are limited to being on the Windows platform before using this one. The quality of the headphones is low. The headphones turned on, while better than anything Sandisk offers, still don't This means that you will probably want to purchase the best set in order to enjoy the quality of the audio output capabilities of this model. The creative Mozaic zen is a very capable device - capable of producing high quality audio output, capable of displaying your photos and videos on bright, bright, and and A (1.8-inch) screen that can help you stay organized by synchronizing with your computer's Outlook app, and is able to keep you entertained for hours on end. While there are a few drawbacks to this particular device in terms of video conversion requirements, memory storage restrictions, and computer interface issues, it's still a stellar option for the price.
5. Apple iPod Shuffle There is absolutely no way to create the best of portable audio list devices without including an Apple product on it, but it may come as a surprise to many that the Apple device has found its way onto the list of portable audio players for budget minded people. The Apple iPod Shuffle is by far the smallest and least multi-feature-rich model in Apple's lineup, but the sound quality is exceptional. Price: \$50 Pros: Compact design. The fourth generation iPod Shuffle is the latest iteration of the smallest MP3 player on the planet. Its small size has been both its good and the scourge of its existence in previous generations, but I can honestly say that the redesigned model has returned to a larger, easier-to-use control function. Intelligent playlist support. You get playlist support, live iTunes compatibility, audiobook and podcast support, as well as something called VoiceOver. Voice menu function. VoiceOver lets you activate a synthesized voice that announces songs by name and artist during the game. Press the button twice to hear an audio interpretation of your remaining battery life, and by holding the button, the voice will enter the menu area, where it will list your menu options for skipping to other songs, audiobooks or playlists. One cool feature is that this voice is tuned into iTunes to speak one of 25 different languages. For some, it's a feature, for others, it's an annoyance. You can judge it. A separate menu system for music and audiobooks. I like the fact that Shuffle organizes audiobooks separately from your music library and podcasts. The reason for this is that when in shuffling mode you don't want random chapters to appear on your music list to interrupt everything you do. Conversely, you want to listen to your books consistently, so they are exempt from the shuffling function. Cons: Lack of video support and limited audio file support. Shuffle is as simple as audio playback devices as there is. No support for photos or videos. You are limited in the formats of AUDIOifiers ACC, MP3, WAV or Audible. You either have to convert other formats or stop adding them to the shuffle. No FM tuner. There's no FM tuner, so if you like to work morning disc jockey chatter, you better look elsewhere. Poor quality headphones. The headphones on don't make the audio output quality this any services, so go ahead and plan to buy quality pairs before you leave the store. Small size. The small size of this device means you don't really own it as much as you actually just borrowing it it Universe. The charger is a property, so if you end up losing the one that comes with the device, be prepared to spend a few bucks at your local outlet for one that will fit it instead of snatching the cord that charges your phone. Support for the iTunes library only. The iTunes library interface is the only way to download or customize audio files. The iPod Shuffle is a good device. The sound quality is excellent, and the organizational capabilities integrated into both the device and iTunes have nothing else. However, Shuffle has many limitations that simply do not exist in other manufacturers' devices even at this price. The final word While MP3 players are slowly gradually in favor of multimedia smartphones, they will never truly disappear. Why? Because it may make sense to use your phone as an audio playback device on your desk, but it doesn't make much sense in the gym. Also, using a separate MP3 device to share music, videos and photos means you'll actually have a charged cell phone battery to call with. you'll do well with any of the devices on this list - the best choice really just depends on your style and preferences.
